

Women Win With the Fair Representation Act

Women are essential to a healthy democracy. Women work collaboratively across party lines, have a variety of lived experiences, and take unique approaches to policy-making.

The Fair Representation Act (FRA) would (1) implement ranked choice voting (RCV) for all U.S. House elections, (2) create multi-member U.S. House districts, and (3) establish an independent redistricting commission to combat gerrymandering. This is critical to leveling the playing field for women candidates and reaching gender-balanced governance.

(Proportional) Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) as a Solution

RCV allows voters to rank candidates in order of preference. RCV benefits women by:


- **Mitigating vote splitting and the spoiler effect.** Women are more often told to "wait their turn." In RCV elections, multiple women can run without splitting the vote.
- Increasing campaign civility and voter-candidate engagement. RCV incentivizes issue-focused campaigning so candidates can prioritize voter concerns.
- **Removing the need for costly runoff elections.** Voters' second and third choices are counted immediately, which benefits women, who often need to outraise men to win.

The Fair Representation Act: Combining RCV and MMDs (PRCV)

A 2021 analysis by RepresentWomen and FairVote found that if the FRA were passed, women would increase their representation by roughly 40% in the U.S. House. **The FRA**, which implements PRCV, **amplifies voter power**, **allowing voters to elect candidates of choice**, **including women**.
